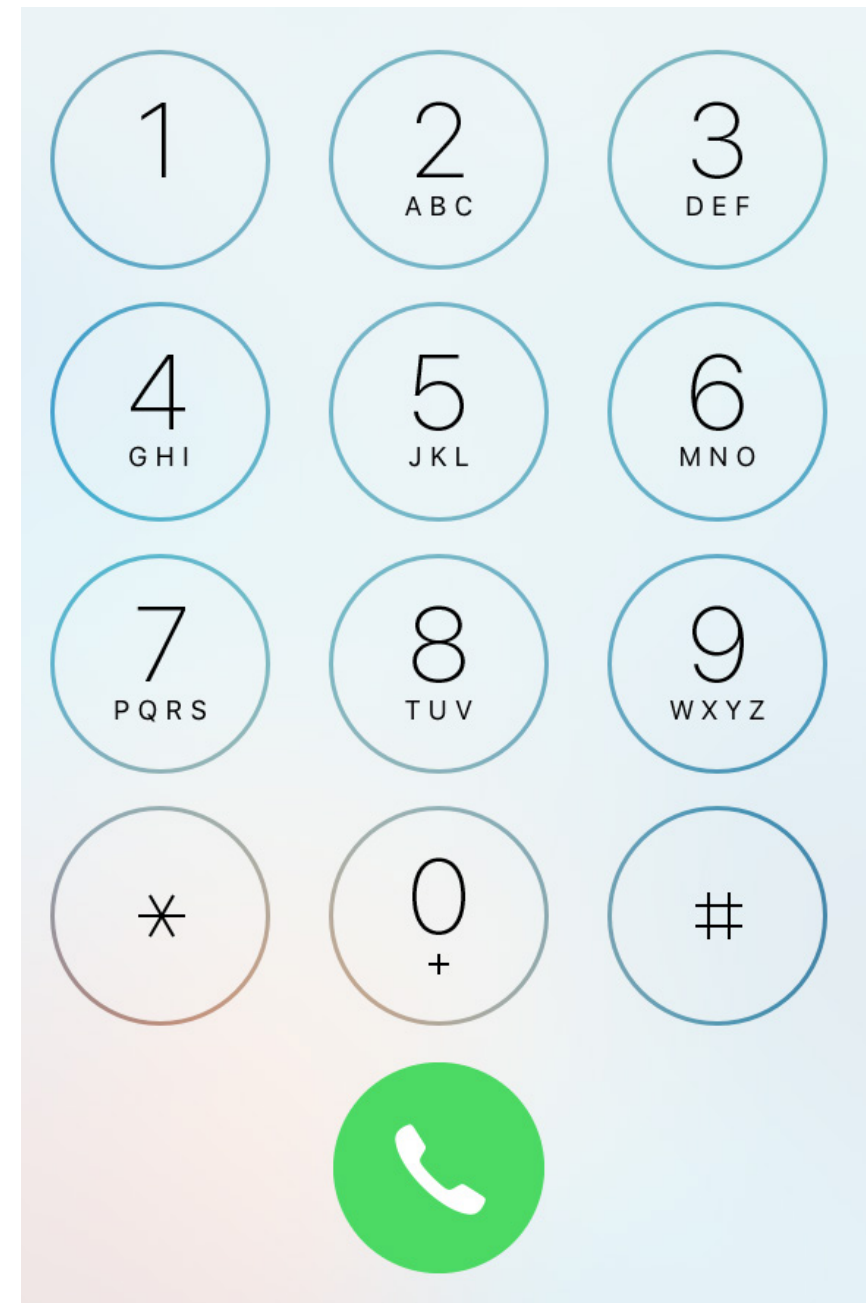

It was a peaceful evening. The sun was just setting over the horizon, its orange, red, and pink colours streaming through the swimming pool window. Another year had rolled around, and it was time for the *It Is Written* Partnership convention once again. Every year, families that financially support *It Is Written* get to experience a weekend retreat at a hotel, along with other families and contributors. For many, this weekend has become a tradition and is something to look forward to. Meeting new people, spending time with friends, hearing amazing sermons, and listening to spiritually-uplifting music is what the weekend is all about. Everything always runs smoothly. Well... almost always.

Saturday nights were when everyone, especially the kids and teenagers, would go swimming. Everyone took turns down the big blue slide, even us as the “big kids.” A group of us upperclassmen had decided to go to the pool together. This group included James, Zach, Reiniel, Clesha, Bria, Nicole, Nadia, and myself. After taking turns down the slide, we decided to play the “dunking

game,” where everyone would get into partners, carrying each other bridal style. One person (not holding anyone) would ask a set of questions to the others. Anyone who got the answer wrong or was the last to answer would get dunked. As you can see, all of us were occupied with our own game, oblivious to the other kids who were swimming, jumping, and playing in the pool.

Around seven minutes into our game, some of us witnessed a frightening sight happening directly behind us...

Unconscious, fragile, blue, and foaming at the mouth, was a young boy who had just been pulled out of the water by another young boy.

We all rushed over as he was laid down on the pool deck. Thank God Mrs. Pelobello was at the pool; she rushed over to us and checked to see if he was breathing. He was not.

She quickly performed CPR; the boy’s chest seemed to be popping out of place with every press. Many of my friends and I are lifeguards, and the look on our faces showed preparation for any task that we might have to do. Clesha and Reiniel quickly exited the pool and grabbed towels to dry off the boy in case we had to shock him as I went over to help Mrs. Pelobello.

After around 45 seconds of CPR, all four of his limbs sprung out into what seemed like an exaggerated stretch. The first gasp of his breath seemed to cause everyone in the room to breathe once again as well. As we put him on his side, loads of water began to exit his system. By this time, his parents had come down and so had the paramedics.

Tears and prayers filled the hotel as the news about this incident spread quickly. Once he got to the hospital, he threw up around two liters of water. It was found out later on that he was not a strong swimmer and was trying to copy the other kids by jumping into the deep end. The moment he hit the water,

he realized that he could not make it back up. He was underwater for a couple of minutes until his friend, the one who had pulled him out, saw him motionless at the bottom of the pool. It was only through God’s grace and the help of the people around him that he was saved.

That night, I learned many valuable lessons. One can never be too sure of his or her own strength. The little boy thought that he could make it back up to the surface, but did not have the strength to. In the process, he lost consciousness for multiple minutes which led to him consuming litres of water. In a way, that is like us humans as sinners. We think that we have the ability to dive headfirst into any situation that we are facing and handle it all on our own. There are many times in life where we think we know how to do everything on our own; we get so comfortable in our own strength and forget that we should truly be getting that strength from God. When we rely on our own abilities, we end up overwhelmed by everything and end up drowning in our problems, with no strength to “swim to the surface.” In the process, we end up “swallowing” a lot of baggage which makes it even harder for us to get back up on our feet. We struggle with ourselves for

days, months, maybe even years.

It has now become impossible for us to survive on our own. It seems that it is when we’re at our lowest that God sees us amidst the chaos of the world. It seems as if He is the only one who even notices our sufferings. It is then that He pulls us out and gives another chance, time and time again, to put our whole trust in Him. With His help, we can “breathe” once again and truly learn how to let go of the baggage we carry from the past.

Psalm 46:1-3 says,

“God is our *refuge* and *strength*, an ever-present help in trouble. Therefore we *will not fear*, though the earth give way and the *mountains* fall into the heart of the sea, though its waters *roar* and *foam* and the mountains *quake* with their surging.”

Even when we feel as if there is no way out of the situation we’re in, we need to cling to God’s promises that He is there with us. There is no need to fear in earthly conflicts and the troubles we face, because God will bring us through. All we need to do is put our full trust in Him. We must surrender our lives into His hands. ■

The singing tour group loaded the bus and took off at around 2 pm that sunny Friday afternoon. After just a few hours of driving, we reached the Nepean Seventh-Day Adventist Church in Ottawa. The options provided included the Dreamland Wax Museum, the USS Constitution (the world's oldest commissioned naval vessel), the Boston Tea Party ships, and the Prudential Center. We finished the day off by purchasing some souvenirs, listening to impressive street musicians, and trying some new foods at the

Faneuil Hall Marketplace. We did some more shopping on Friday afternoon, in Burlington. 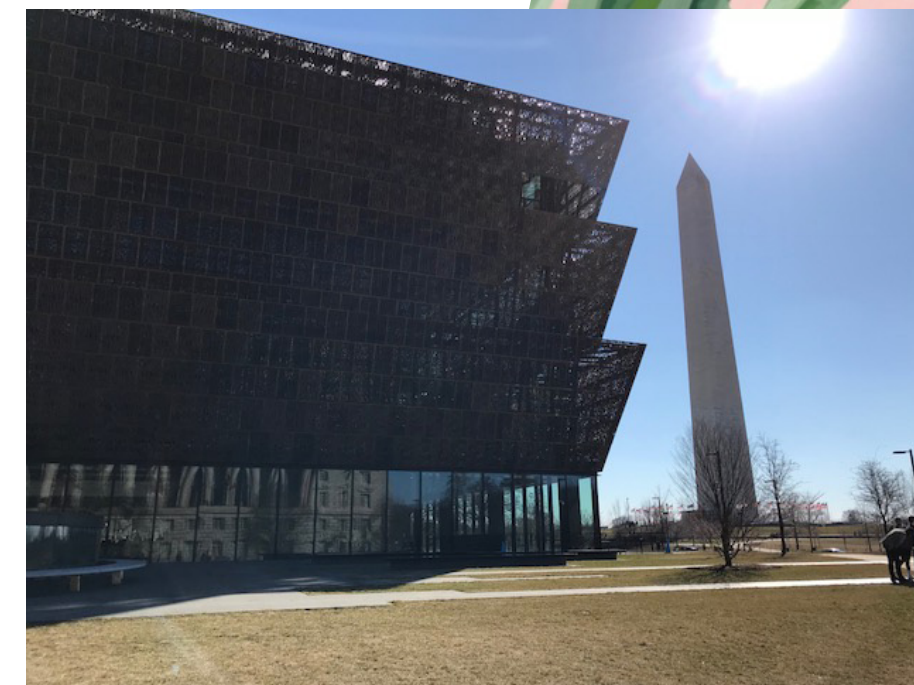
I asked Marcia what she thought about the whole experience, and the first thing out of her mouth was, “A horse ran past me.”
