



MOUNT WILLIAM – When David Hamilton '84 agreed to having his church sponsor an aerials gymnastics show, he didn't expect to find himself being lifted high into the air with teenagers holding his legs and feet. Albeit reluctantly, the pastor of Seventh-day Adventist Church in New Glasgow became a participant in the show put on by the Kingsway College Aerials on Monday night at the Pictou County YMCA. "I didn't mind being lifted up," he said, but admits he was a little nervous. "I was a little bit concerned they would spin me over and do a backflip." The trick turned out fine, though, and Hamilton was returned safely to the ground.

About 200 people attended the show, including members of the church and the local gymnastics club, with younger members of the audience participating like Hamilton did. His wife Cheryl said she enjoyed the interaction with the audience. "Several times they stopped the performance, and did a headstand contest and held up kids really, really high," she said. "I really liked their personal touch."

Kingsway College is a private Christian high school owned and operated by the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Oshawa, Ont. The school offers classes for students in grades 9 to 12 with a program designed to develop the whole person, focusing on the academic, spiritual, physical, and social aspects of the student. About 34 students from the school took part in the local show, one of several the aerials team is performing as part of a March Break tour that includes stops in New Brunswick and the United States.

The team was formed in 1983 as a way to promote a drug-free lifestyle. The squad upholds that message while providing character building for its members who must learn to rely on each other to master the intricate and complex routines.

Hamilton said the local church had two goals for the evening – to provide wholesome fun and to help spread the message of the Bible. "For people who don't go to church, we thought it would be a nice way to lift up Jesus, to lift up the Lord to the community and have a fun time together." He attended Kingsway College himself when he was a teenager, and said he was impressed with the performance. "They're very skilled."

The aerials team performed a large number of routines involving dance moves, tumbling and flips, using various props such as chairs and an acrobatic ring suspended from a large tripod. One of the skits portrayed the life of Jesus from his birth to his death and resurrection.

It all happened 73 years ago. Bobby was a 9th grade high school student in his hometown of Pembroke, Ontario. His dad had died four years previously and his mother had few resources with which to keep the family together. She did have skills, however. She was an experienced paperhanger, and some wealthy people were happy to purchase her skills at \$1 an hour.

Bobby didn't know anything about Oshawa Missionary College, but was sponsored by a proud supporter of OMC, Mr. William Brown. The result was a partial scholarship for Bobby to cover what he couldn't work off. Mr. and Mrs. McPherson of Oshawa picked Bobby up at the railway station and delivered him to the boy's dorm in care of his new roommate, Carl Tibbets, from Quebec. Neither Carl nor Bobby knew what a "march" was, but they soon learned, and subsequently survived the first Saturday evening at OMC.

Bobby is now Dr. Robert Burgess (Ph.D), retired hospital president and university professor, who has given more than 40 years of service to the Seventh-day Adventist Church. Fifteen of those years were served overseas in five different countries, the last two years being in China as the first Director of ADRA China Services. He also served his community at home and overseas by being a lifetime member of Kiwanis International Service Club, twice as club President and once as Lieutenant Governor of his district.

Two of the highlights of Dr. Bob's days at OMC were the day of his baptism along with classmate Dave Lawson and others in the creek behind the Lawson home on Townline and his job at the woodwork shop assembling ladders, ironing boards, and chest of drawers. He enjoyed his job at the woodwork to the point that often he would skip class and go to work. He was elected President of Vox Viri Association, the Boy's Dorm Club, and Captain of the Dorm Hockey Team.

This brings Dr. Burgess to his final and greatest OMC accomplishment, that of finding his bride of now 67 years, Treva Graves, of Moncton, New Brunswick.

David Russell



1939-2015

David Lewis Russell, 76, died suddenly at his home in Blacksburg, VA on Sunday, October 4, 2015. David was born in Orlando, FL on May 1, 1939, the son of George and Marion Russell. He spent most of his childhood in Newfoundland and his high school years at OMC/ Kingsway where he graduated in 1956. Following high school David attended Andrews University, graduating in 1960. Four years later, at the age of 24, he earned a PhD in Mathematics from the University of Minnesota, St. Paul.

While attending OMC David was considered to be quite "brainy" and some of his teachers had difficulty finding marks to take off his school work; however, he was also suspected of a number of campus pranks. He enjoyed writing and scurried up items for the school newspaper, The Cedar Sentinel, hiding his identity under his column pseudonym, "Looie," a takeoff on his middle name. David always had a place in his heart for Kingsway and visited on a number of alumni weekends. He was very interested in staying in touch with his teachers, classmates and school friends. One of his last plans was to visit the campus again but it was not to be.

During his career David was a Professor of Mathematics at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, from 1965 to 1988, and with Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University (Virginia Tech), Blacksburg, from 1988 until his death. Dr. Russell specialized in the fields of mathematics known as Ordinary and Partial Differential Equations, Systems Theory, Elasticity, Mathematical Modeling, and Control Theory. He was particularly interested in practical applications of mathematics and carried out work for Honeywell Inc., Battelle Laboratories, the U.S. Army Fire Control Division, the U.S. Naval Surface Weapons Center, the U.W. Modelling Information Processing and Control (MIPAC) Facility, the U.S. Army Applied Mathematics Steering Committee, and was a member of the NSF Panel on Future Directions in Control Theory.

David was well known for his quiet intelligence, kindness, integrity, and humour. He was a capable carpenter, a skilled artist, an avid reader, opera fan, and a world traveler who could communicate in several languages. When on assignment in France and several other countries, he lectured using the French he learned from OMC/Kingsway teacher Boris Pache.

David is sadly missed by his wife, Susan Li Russell, and children, Jessica Wu Russell and Robert Wu, and by the children from his first marriage to Rebecca Kovener Russell: Raymond (Janice) Russell; James (Marion) Russell; Matthew (Sveta) Russell, and four grandchildren. Also surviving are his sister, Carolyn (Russell) Osmond, nieces and nephews, extended family and many friends and colleagues. David was laid to rest in the Westview Cemetery in Blacksburg, VA on October 11, 2015.

1951-2015



She was predeceased in 2005 by her daughter, Jocelyn, and is survived by her husband and children, Chad, Mason and Daron.
